Day 1

The topics for the competition were-

- 1. Same Sex marriage Should It Be Legal?
- 2. Green Hydrogen: Are We Heading Towards Zero Carbon Future?
- 3. There Is No Place For Morality In Today's Politics.
- 4. Age of marriage for women should be increased.

These topics challenged the participants to think critically and articulate their positions effectively. The debates were conducted in three languages i.e. Hindi English and Marathi. Each debate consisted of opening statements, rebuttals and closing arguments.

The quality of debates was exceptionally high, reflecting the dedication and hard work put in by the students and their coaches. Participants demonstrated strong research skills, clear communication, and the ability to engage in respectful and constructive discourse. The debaters covered the huge spectrum as their

research consisted the ancient mythology of 'Lord Shiva being attracted to Lord Vishnu's Mohini Avatar' to 'Navtej Singh Johar v. Union of India SC verdict of 2018'. The debaters also stated strong points against the topic such as "God made Adam and Eve, not Adam and Steve." and "When a same Sex couple adopts a child who is the mother and who is the father? For proper upbringing/growth one needs a father and a mother both." Few also questioned the Sex education in the system in India.

The participants made impactful statements like 'Being moral is difficult while being rational', "Where there is politics there is no morality", "Politics is not about Left and Right, it is about Top and Bottom". Participants also exhibited reference to Gandhi's 'Antyodaya', current events of devastating violence and incidents in Manipur. One also stated a quote from the then PM of India Atal Bihari Vajpayee's speech before facing the no-confidence vote in 1996, "Sarkaare ayengi, jaayengi, paristitiya banengi, bigdengi magar ye desh rehana chahiye".

A panel of experienced judges, consisting of professors, professionals, and experts in various fields, evaluated the debates.
